RALPH O. NAFZIGER AWARD - 2020



JACOB KUSHNER

Jacob Kushner is a foreign correspondent who writes magazine and other long-form articles from Africa, Germany and the Caribbean. His articles have appeared in dozens of publications including The New York Times, The Atlantic, The New Yorker, Harper's, The Economist, National Geographic, Foreign Policy and The Guardian.

Originally from Milwaukee, Jacob graduated from UW-Madison in 2010 with a BA in Journalism and Latin American, Caribbean and Iberian Studies. He wrote for The Daily Cardinal, La Comunidad News and reported on immigration for the Wisconsin Center for Investigative Journalism. He received

his MA in Political Journalism from Columbia University and was a Fulbright Scholar in Berlin.

Jacob's master's thesis, "China's Congo Plan," about Chinese migration to Congo, was published by The Pulitzer Center and favorably reviewed in The New York Review of Books. In 2020 he co-published "This is How the Heart Beats," about Africa's LGBTQ refugees, with photographer Jake Naughton (UW Journalism & African Studies '10). Jacob is currently writing "White Terror," the true story of the serial assassinations and bombings carried out by three modern white nationalists to rid Germany of immigrants.

RALPH O. NAFZIGER AWARD - 2021



RACHEL DICKENS

Rachel Dickens has spent the past decade pursuing the belief that every organization needs a savvy communications practice in order to thrive. While she specializes in public relations, Rachel has also led companies through periods of crisis, coached executives to speak before thousands of people and tutored a classroom of second graders at a Chicagoarea elementary school.

The daughter of a writing professor, Rachel's early exposure to language was more akin to baptism by fire. At age four, Rachel's mother found her reenacting Shakespeare's "The Tempest" with her stuffed animals. By age ten, Rachel's tastes had

transitioned away from Renaissance plays and toward Matt Groening's cartoon canon.

A lifelong champion of working and playing hard, Rachel found her collegiate home at the University of Wisconsin-Madison (class of 2011). After brief stints as both a political science and film major, Rachel was admitted to the School of Journalism and Mass Communication, where she felt her academic strengths and personal passions truly collide for the first time. During her time at UW, Rachel also penned The Badger Herald's "Hump Day" column, which provided students with a fresh perspective on dating, sex and relationships.

While Rachel's career is still in its relative infancy, she's been lucky to find a niche in the food and beverage industry. After working on the PR agency side for clients like Kraft Heinz and Mars Wrigley, Rachel served as director of marketing and public relations for One Off Hospitality Group, led by James Beard Award winner, Paul Kahan (The Publican, avec, Big Star).

A Wisconsin alum through and through, Rachel was lured away from fine dining by the beer industry in 2018, when she joined the communications team at Molson Coors Beverage Company. While Molson Coors makes iconic Midwestern favorites like Miller Lite and Miller High Life, Rachel oversees PR for the company's largest brand, Coors. In her two-plus years with the company, Rachel has led Coors Light through a full brand relaunch under the wildly successful "Made to Chill" campaign.

Rachel has been recognized by Adweek as one of Chicago's "Rising Brand Stars" (2017), and by the UW-Madison SJMC as its 2021 Nafziger Award honoree. She lives in Chicago's Bucktown neighborhood with her partner, Charlie, and her dog, Abe.

HAROLD L. NELSON AWARD - 2020



WILLIAM "CHIP" EVELAND, PhD

Dr. William "Chip" Eveland, Jr. (PhD, University of Wisconsin, 1997) is Professor of Communication and (by courtesy) Political Science at The Ohio State University (2000-present).

Prior to his arrival at Ohio State, Eveland was an assistant professor of communication (1998-2000) and he also worked in a research role for the Wisconsin Center for Education Research (1996-1998) evaluating online science communication efforts.

Eveland's academic research focuses on the role of political communication in developing informed and participatory citizens of democracy, both in

the U.S. and also, increasingly, around the globe. Although his early research focused on the effects of news media use on political knowledge and participation, more recently his work has highlighted the important role of the structure and content of political discussion networks in democracy.

Eveland's most recent work emphasizes the important role of "listening" in political conversations where there are deep divides, not only due to partisanship but also across lines of racial difference and about race-related topics.

Eveland has published in the fields of communication, political science, sociology and psychology, and much of that published work has centered on empirical evaluation of the survey measurement of concepts such as news media use, political conversation, network heterogeneity/disagreement/diversity, discussion network size and political knowledge.

HAROLD L. NELSON AWARD - 2021



ANNIE LANG, PhD

Annie Lang (Ph.D. University of Wisconsin-Madison) is a Distinguished Professor of Communication Science and Cognitive Science at Indiana University. Her current research seeks to understand communication as an emergent behavior in a complex dynamic system consisting of at least one human and one message embedded in an environment. Her research has resulted in over 100 academic publications and been supported by almost \$3 million in grants. She is a past editor of the journal Media Psychology, winner of AEJMC's Kreighbaum Award, a Fellow of the International Communication Association and recipient of their Steven H. Chaffee Career Productivity Award.



LUCY ATKINSON, PhD

Lucy Atkinson (PhD, University of Wisconsin–Madison) is an associate professor in the Stan Richards School of Advertising and PR in the Moody College of Communication at the University of Texas at Austin. Her research looks at communication in the context of sustainability and the environment. She focuses on the ways message components (like visual elements, argument frames, source factors) in environmental communication campaigns influence environmental attitudes, beliefs and behaviors.

She has received research funding from the Department of Energy, the Portuguese Foundation for Science and Technology, the Waterhouse Family

Institute for the Study of Communication and Society and the Arthur W. Page Center at Penn State. Atkinson's work has appeared in top-ranked flagship journals, like the Journal of Advertising, International Journal of Communication, Environmental Communication and Science Communication. Outside of academia, her work has been covered in international and national news media, including The Guardian (UK) newspaper, and National Public Radio's "Weekend Edition" and "On Point with Tom Ashbrook."

Atkinson is a senior faculty research affiliate with the UT Center for Media Engagement in the Moody College of Communication and a faculty affiliate with the Environmental Science Institute, the Center for Health Communication, the Center for Women's and Gender Studies and the RGK Center for Philanthropy and Community Service.

She teaches classes on advertising history, environmental communication, integrated communication campaigns and consumer psychology. In 2016 she was named a recipient of the UT System Regent's Outstanding Teaching Award and in 2017 was named a Provost Teaching Fellow.

Before pursuing her doctorate, Atkinson worked for several years as a newspaper reporter in New York.

Atkinson completed her MA at New York University and her BA at McGill University.



EMILY VRAGA, PhD

Emily Vraga is an associate professor in the Hubbard School of Journalism and Mass Communication at the University of Minnesota, where she holds the Don and Carole Larson Professorship in Health Communication. Her research tests methods to identify and correct misinformation on social media, to apply news literacy to limit biased processing of news messages and to encourage attention to more diverse content online.



NAMJIN LEE, PhD

Namjin Lee joined the Department of Communication at the College of Charleston in 2010. He teaches courses on such topics as political communication, public opinion in American politics, effects of mass communication and communication research methods.

Dr. Lee received his PhD in mass communication from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Prior to joining the Department, he served as a Research Fellow with a project funded by the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation. In this position, he conducted research on the role of new digital media in promoting civic and political engagement

among young people. Before beginning his academic career, he worked as a television journalist in South Korea, where he was a correspondent with the Seoul Broadcasting System (SBS). He holds an MA in journalism and mass communication from UW-Madison and a BA in history from Seoul National University. He lives in Mount Pleasant, SC with his wife, Young, and their son, Sean.

His research concerns the role that political communication plays in our civic and political lives, with a special interest in how the consumption of news content in traditional and new media influences the ways in which people understand political matters, formulate political judgments and participate in the political process. He has developed programs of research on (a) the capacity of mediated and interpersonal communication, particularly the Internet, to foster democratic citizenship, (b) media effects on political judgment and reasoning and (c) the interplay of consumer culture and civic culture. He has published articles presenting this work in Annals of the American Academy of Political and Social Science, Communication Research, Journal of Communication, and Political Communication, along with several book chapters.



KJERSTIN THORSON, PhD

Kjerstin Thorson is an associate professor in the College of Communication Arts & Sciences at Michigan State University and Director of Graduate Studies in the Department of Advertising and Public Relations. Her research explores how social media platforms are reshaping the visibility of news and politics and the democratic consequences of information inequality, especially among youth and young adults. Her work appears in leading academic journals, including Journal of Communication, Information, Communication & Society, New Media & Society and Communication Theory. She is the recipient of the Michigan State University Teacher-Scholar Award. Dr. Thorson received her MA from

the University of Missouri and her PhD from the University of Wisconsin-Madison.



PETE MARINO

Pete Marino is the President of Emerging Growth for Molson Coors Beverage Company.

In his role, Marino is responsible for overseeing a collection of businesses that operate within emerging markets or categories with a portfolio of products positioned to capitalize on shifting consumer preferences within both alcoholic and non-alcoholic beverages.

Those business divisions include Tenth and Blake (craft beer division), Latin America and the Caribbean, cannabis beverages, wine and spirits, non-alcohol beverages, and mergers and acquisitions.

Additionally, the company owns a beer distributorship serving the Denver, CO market that reports to Marino.

Prior to his current role, Marino was the President of Tenth and Blake as well as the Chief Public Affairs and Communications Officer for MillerCoors, overseeing public affairs, state and federal government affairs, corporate social responsibility, brand PR and communications. Prior to that, Marino started and sold an award-winning public relations agency based in Chicago called Dig Communications.

Marino holds an MBA from The Anderson School at UCLA and a BA in journalism from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He is a die-hard Badgers fan and credits his time in Madison as instrumental in his development. He's active in his community serving on several non-profit boards, including Boys Hope Girls Hope Illinois and the Chicago Sports Commission. Marino lives in the Chicago suburbs with his wife Jennifer and their three kids.



KAREN WALSH

Karen Walsh is director of the Berbeewalsh Foundation, a family foundation dedicated to human and animal health and welfare, and serves on the UW System Board of Regents. Since 2006, the foundation has awarded more than \$8 million dollars in grants in the State of Wisconsin, including a gift to the University of Wisconsin Hospitals and Clinics that created the Berbeewalsh Department of Emergency Medicine. She was a newscaster and reporter for news outlets including Wisconsin Public Radio prior to serving for 23 years in a variety of public information and communications positions at UW-Madison. She retired in 2005 as the Assistant Dean for External Relations in the College

of Engineering, directing alumni and donor communications, news media relations and industry communications. She also directed the college's undergraduate student invention and prototyping competitions, the School's Prize for Creativity and Tong Prototype Prize. Her honors include publications awards with the National Association of Government Communicators, the University's Bollinger Academic Staff Achievement Award and Philanthropist of the Year from the Dane County Humane Society.

A native of Columbus, Wisconsin, Walsh holds bachelor's and master's degrees in journalism from UW-Madison. She serves on a number of non-profit boards, including the Board of Visitors at the UW-Madison School of Veterinary Medicine, the Madison Cat Project and the Access Community Health Centers Community Partners Board. She is also a past president of the Madison Opera Board of Trustees. She and her husband, Dr. James Berbee, live in Madison.



ALI ZELENKO

Ali Zelenko is senior vice president, strategic initiatives of NBC News. In this role, she is responsible for creating and driving major efforts that further the strategic goals of the News division. She was also tapped to run a large-scale campaign on behalf of Comcast NBCUniversal, leveraging the company's assets to promote the COVID-19 vaccination rollout to the general public.

Previously, she was senior vice president of communications for NBC News for six years, serving as chief spokesperson and overseeing all strategic communications and media relations for its units and broadcasts, including "NBC Nightly News with

Lester Holt," "TODAY," "Meet the Press" and "Dateline."

Zelenko joined NBC News in September 2013 from Time Inc., where she had served since 2006 as senior vice president of communications for TIME, FORTUNE, Money and CNNMoney.com. She was in charge of programming and publicity for the annual TIME 100 Gala, one of the most high-profile events in media; and she also managed promotion for key FORTUNE conferences, including the annual Most Powerful Women Summit, and its Global Forum events in Capetown and Chengdu, China.

At Time Warner, which she joined in 1998, Zelenko served in a number of other media relations roles, including as PR director at CNN in Washington, and PEOPLE in New York, and as vice president of corporate communications for Time Inc. Previously Zelenko worked in the Washington offices of two international PR firms, APCO Worldwide and Edelman Worldwide.

In 2020 Zelenko received the Distinguished Service Award from her alma mater, the School of Journalism and Mass Communications at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. She also received their Nafziger Award in 2003, which annually honors one recent graduate for professional achievement. She also served for two years as the chair of the Board of Visitors of the school.

Zelenko is an active board member of City Year New York, and lives in Manhattan with her husband Dan, and their two sons.



DEBORAH BLUM

Deborah Blum, director of the Knight Science Journalism program at MIT and the publisher of Undark magazine, is a Pulitzer-Prize winning science journalist, columnist and author of six books, most recently, The Poison Squad, a 2018 New York Times Notable Book.

That book, as with all her most recent books, focuses on influential moments in the history of science. Others include the New York Times bestseller, "The Poisoner's Handbook" (2010), to "Ghost Hunters" (2006) and "Love at Goon Park" (2002). A coeditor of two editions of "A Field Guide for Science Writers," she is now under contract with Oxford

University Press as a co-editor of a forthcoming guide to science journalism. She has worked as a science columnist for The New York Times, a blogger for Wired, and has written for other publications ranging from The Wall Street Journal to Mother Jones, The Guardian to Lapham's Quarterly. Her work has been anthologized in Best American Science Writing, Best American Nature Writing and Best Science On-Line.


Before joining MIT in the summer of 2015, she was the Helen Firstbrook Franklin Professor of Journalism at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, a position she held for 18 years. Previously, she worked at five different newspapers, including as a staff science writer for The Sacramento Bee, where she won the Pulitzer in 1992 for her reporting on ethical issues in primate research. She received her ABJ from the University of Georgia in 1976 and her MA from the University of Wisconsin-Madison's School of Journalism and Mass Communication in 1982.

Blum is a past president of the National Association of Science Writers and a former board member of the World Federation of Science Journalists. She serves on the advisory boards of the Council for the Advancement of Science Writing, Chemical and Engineering News, Spectrum, The Scientist and the MIT Museum. She is a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and a lifetime associate of the National Academy of Sciences, both in recognition of her work in public understanding of science.



MEG JONES

Meg Jones was at home virtually anywhere in Wisconsin, reporting on the character — and characters — of her home state for the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel and Sentinel since 1993. She was part of a team named a Pulitzer Prize finalist in 2003 for coverage of chronic wasting disease in the state's deer herd. A UW-Madison graduate and former member of the Badger band and women's crew team, the Rhinelander native had a passion for covering weather and military affairs. Since the war on terror started after 9/11, she made eight trips overseas to cover Wisconsin troops in battle — four trips to Iraq and four to Afghanistan.



MARY ANNETTE PEMBER

Pember is currently national correspondent for Indian Country Today. She has worked as an independent journalist focusing on Native American issues since 2000. Her work has appeared in other venues including the Atlantic, The Guardian, The Washington Post, Al Jazeera, The New York Times, Rewire News, The Columbia Journalism Review, Yes Magazine, In These Times and others. She worked as a staff photojournalist and photo editor for mainstream daily newspapers for several years before beginning her writing career. In her writing and photography she has covered subjects including the high rates of sexual assault among Native women, sex trafficking, missing and murdered

Indigenous women, health, impact of historical trauma on Native communities and environmental challenges on Native lands, federal policy issues as well as cultural and spiritual topics.

Pember is the recipient of numerous media industry awards including The Clarion Award, Medill Lifetime Achievement Award, Best Environmental Writing and Photography from the Native American Journalists Association, The Associated Press and others. She has been awarded grants and fellowships from Type Investigations Ida B. Wells Fellowship, the Rosalynn Carter Fellowship for Mental Health Journalism, University of Southern California Annenberg National Health Journalism Fellowship, The MacDowell Colony, the International Center for Journalists Data Award, the University of Maryland Journalism Fellowships in Child and Family Policy and others. She is an enrolled citizen of the Red Cliff Band of Wisconsin Ojibwe tribe and is past president of the Native American Journalists Association. She currently lives in Cincinnati, Ohio with her family.
