RALPH O. NAFZIGER AWARD



PAM GOLDSTEIN

Pam Goldstein leads McDonald's global crisis communications and works to protect the brand. Pam is a crisis communications expert who has been on the front lines of some of the largest and most complex corporate issues. She was named to PR Week's 40 Under 40 in 2021.

In 2020, Pam led McDonald's global response to COVID-19, overseeing key decision-making and strategy-setting

that guided over 100 market teams and enabled the company to build trust. Pam led McDonald's partnership with The White House to roll out nationwide vaccine education across U.S. restaurants. She received the McDonald's President's Award, which recognizes the top 1 percent of corporate staff, and the Circle of Excellence Award in 2020 in recognition of this work.

Pam joined McDonald's from Edelman's Crisis & Risk Management practice, where she guided companies through high-profile issues. Pam led response efforts around one of the largest global product recalls, which invited intense government scrutiny. She co-led Edelman's Data Security & Privacy Group and directed war room efforts for one of the most impactful data breaches on record, which included Congressional hearings and permanently altered the data security landscape.

Prior to joining Edelman, Pam worked at the White House in the Office of Presidential Personnel, where she managed candidate vetting efforts and public records research for appointments by President Barack Obama to positions in the Departments of Justice, Labor, Education and Health & Human Services.

Pam graduated from UW-Madison with honors in strategic communications and political science. Pam lives in Chicago with her husband and one-year-old daughter, is a (very) amateur cook and baker and avid watcher of all things Shonda Rhimes.

R. LANCE HOLBERT, PhD

R. Lance Holbert is Professor of Communication and Social Influence within Temple University's Klein College of Media and Communication.

Lance's research focuses on the persuasion-based processes of media influence within the context of politics. He has authored or co-authored over 100 peer-reviewed journal articles, books or book chapters.

Lance is also a Distinguished Research Fellow in the University of Pennsylvania's Annenberg Public Policy Center, an International Communication Association (ICA) Fellow, and he just wrapped up a stint as Editor-in-Chief of Journal of Communication. He served as Chair of ICA's and National Communication Association's (NCA) Mass Communication Divisions, as well as NCA's Political Communication Division. He is also a past recipient of the NCA Mass Communication Division's Teacher of the Year Award.

MATTHEW BARNIDGE, PhD

Matthew Barnidge is an assistant professor in the Department of Journalism and Creative Media at the University of Alabama.

Matthew's research specializes in comparative political communication with a focus on how political news and public opinion are shaped by media systems, social norms and digital platforms. He is an associate editor of the International Journal of Public Opinion Research, and

he has published more than 40 peer-reviewed articles in journals such as Journal of Communication, Political Communication, International Journal of Press/Politics, and Digital Journalism.

Matthew is from Houston, Texas, and he spent two years living in Vienna, Austria, where he was a postdoctoral researcher at the University of Vienna. He enjoys chess, music, history and travel.

ERICA SALKIN, PhD

Dr. Erica Salkin is an associate professor of communication studies and associate dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at Whitworth University. She joined the faculty in 2012 after completing her Ph.D. in mass communication with a minor in educational leadership and policy analysis from the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Erica's research focuses on freedom of expression in academic settings, and

she is the author of several articles and books on student media and student speech rights. Her most recent book, *Private Schools and Student Media: Supporting Mission, Students, and Community* from Lexington Books, explores the world of private school student media, and it led her becoming a founding board member for the Private School Journalism Association (PSJA). Erica teaches courses in media writing, digital media, public relations and free speech. In 2014, she helped five students start Whitworth's thriving student-run PR agency, Beyond the Pines, and currently advises the student newspaper, *The Whitworthian*.

Erica is the recipient of the 2012 Joseph C. Beckham dissertation of the year award from the Education Law Association, and at Whitworth has been recognized by the Provost with the Junior Faculty Award in 2015 and Service Award in 2018. She has twice been named a "Most Influential Professor" by the senior class and was selected to deliver the undergraduate commencement address in 2023.

Among her students and colleagues, Erica is known as an ardent supporter of free speech, geek culture, the Green Bay Packers and the elimination of the Oxford comma.

COBURN DUKEHART

Coburn Dukehart is the Associate Director for Wisconsin Watch. In her role she acts as head of product, directs visual and digital strategy, creates visual content and trains student journalists.

Coburn has spent more than 20 years in a career spanning digital strategy, product development, photojournalism and multimedia storytelling. She previously was a senior photo editor at National Geographic, picture and

multimedia editor at NPR, and a photo editor at USATODAY.com and WashingtonPost.com. She has received awards from the National Press Photographers Association, Pictures of the Year International, the White House News Photographers Association, the Webbys, the Edward R. Murrow awards, the Milwaukee Press Club, and has been nominated for a national Emmy.

Coburn holds Bachelor's degrees in journalism and English from the University of Wisconsin-Madison and a Master's degree in photojournalism from the University of Missouri-Columbia. She lives in Madison with her husband Brad Horn and daughters Quinn and River.

GARY MUELLER

Gary Mueller is an Executive Creative Director at BVK, and founder of Serve Marketing, the country's only allvolunteer, not-for-profit ad agency.

A legend in Wisconsin advertising, Gary helped transform BVK, with 15 people in 1989, into a \$250+ million national powerhouse. His bold and provocative campaigns are featured in more than a

dozen textbooks and his work has been lauded around the globe from the New York Times, CNN, and the BBC, to Newsweek, Adweek and the White House.

A graduate of UW-Madison's J-school in 1986, Gary is the only three-time president of Milwaukee's United Adworkers, the ad club he co-founded in 2001.

And in 2021, he not only became the youngest inductee ever into Wisconsin's Advertising Hall of Fame, but former Milwaukee Mayor Tom Barrett honored his impact on the city, by naming a day after him.

But it's Gary's passion for giving back that he is best known for. Having launched over 100 public service advocacy campaigns, he has not only changed the way non-profit organizations market themselves, but he has impacted countless lives. From helping to reduce the foster care shortage and co-sleeping deaths, to increasing youth STD testing and twice stopping shaken baby epidemics in Milwaukee, to helping the city lower its teen pregnancy rate by a historic 65 percent. Gary and his Serve volunteers have helped shine a light on over 75 crisis causes and donated over \$20 million in in-kind services to underserved non-profits since 2003.

Today, Gary lives in Mequon, Wisconsin with his wife, Deb and three kids, Mia, Ty and Zoe.

PHIL ROSENTHAL

Phil Rosenthal is a former columnist for the Chicago Tribune, Chicago Sun-Times and Los Angeles Daily News.

Over his career of more than 40 years, his work has taken him to multiple Olympics, Super Bowls and NBA Finals, Wimbledon, the Emmys, Oscars, MTV Video Music Awards, the camps of TV's "Survivor" in French Polynesia, and elsewhere.

Phil wrote for The Capital Times while in college. He covered sports and media and won a Wisconsin Newspaper Association award for deadline reporting on a triple homicide. He also was a stringer for the Associated Press, United Press International and USA Today.

Upon graduation from UW-Madison, Phil joined Los Angeles' Daily News. He was a sports beat writer on UCLA football and basketball and then the Los Angeles Rams. He segued from a weekly sports media column to become the paper's TV critic in 1989 and then a pop culture columnist.

Phil returned home to the Midwest in 1996 with the Chicago Sun-Times, where he wrote a sports column for a little more than two years – and three Michael Jordan NBA championships – before becoming its television critic. The Chicago Tribune hired him as media columnist in 2005, then made him its general business columnist in 2011 before he returned to sports in 2016, focusing primarily on media. He was among dozens of long-time Tribune staffers to volunteer for a buyout in 2021.

Phil is a former board member of the Television Critics Association and a past chairman of the UW-Madison School of Journalism and Mass Communication's Board of Visitors. He is married with two children and resides in Chicago.
